CHAIRMAN'S UPDATE – APRIL 2024

Happy Spring everyone! Hoping that we can all enjoy a sunny and dryer spring and summer to make up for the wet winter we have had.

High Street Residents' Parking and Pedestrian Safety Plan approved – You have probably heard that the new parking scheme was approved at an OCC Highways Cabinet member decision meeting on 25th January. We still haven't received a specific timeframe for the changes to go into effect, other than it is planned for this fiscal year. I know some residents were concerned about the changes, but there was clear overall support in the village for this and I believe the most significant concerns were addressed by changes to the scheme during the consultation. The Parish Council remains committed to monitoring the impacts of the changes during the first year following their implementation and working with the County Council to make any appropriate adjustments where needed. A special thanks to TAPWG members who worked so hard in recent years to develop the scheme for the village under the leadership of Cllr Diana Smith

Refurbished benches in Manor Road playground – Thanks to Cllr Katherine Higley for having the benches in the playground refurbished to a very high standard. Three more benches that were recently donated by a local resident are due to be refurbished shortly. This work was funded by a grant from SODC. Further work is planned soon to clear some laurel bushes that will free up some space for recreation.

Tea Hut Demolition – Thanks to Cllr Frances Parkes for securing the contractor to demolish the Tea Hut that has deteriorated to the point that it was not safe for use. The work was done over school holidays with minimal disruption to the surface of the green. Everyone was surprised to see that the Tea Hut had a concrete base under it; this has been retained. The Parish Council is looking at options to develop replacement facilities that could be used for Fetes and other community activities on the Village Green. We would welcome help in designing and procuring a new facility from any volunteers who may have experience they could offer.

Village Green Car Park Repair – Thanks again to Cllr Parkes for arranging the repair of an area of the Village Green car park with matching 'grasscrete' surface that had been damaged for some time. We are pleased that this work was done to such a high-quality standard and should ensure that the car park surface remains attractive and safe for the foreseeable future.

Leaky tap/stopcock on north end of the Village Green – Once more thanks to Cllr Parkes for working with Thames Water to have the tap at the top end of the field repaired by Thames Water after the PC agreed to take responsibility for fixing this from the Cricket Club in November.

Graffiti – You may have noticed that some village signs and fences in the village were subjected to graffiti. This is unfortunately also a problem in other villages such as Goring where it can be seen on the train bridge. Thanks to Cllrs Parkes and Higley for removing graffiti from a Speedwatch sign and on the Manor Road playground. Apparently, the graffiti can be removed with white spirit and some elbow grease. Again, we welcome any volunteers to remove the graffiti if you come across it in the village.

Grants – The Parish Council does not fund community groups on an ongoing basis but can make grants to community organisations on a case-by-case basis. We have been giving an annual grant of £800 to the Pangbourne Community toilets which we believe has a direct benefit to the residents of the village. We recently contributed £500 to repair the gate at the allotments. Finally, we agreed to contribute £300 towards new acoustic cladding for the Old Stables which supports many community activities. The cladding will make it easier for conversation to take place in crowded events such as the Art Café.

Residents' issues – We have been working to address a number of issues raised by residents in the past couple of months:

- Lights out in upper and lower narrows We have had persistent problems getting faulty lights repaired in two key locations on the High Street. These have required an unusual amount of escalation and chasing with both OCC and SSE. The crux of the problem seems to be that OCC is responsible for the operation of the lamps and bulbs, but SSE is responsible for faults with the power and their cooperation is less than ideal.
 - A light by the lower narrows at the Ferryboat (no. 2) was finally fixed as of 9th January with the help of a temporary light provided by the

- neighbouring resident.
- A light at upper narrows (no. 7) at the Hardwick Road intersection is still
 not working consistently. OCC is working with SSE but there seems to
 be a lot of finger-pointing between the two organisations. It has been
 temporarily fixed on at least a couple of occasions recently only to
 become faulty a few days later.
- Repair of pavement at Ferryboat needs to be made good after SSE work –
 OCC had stated that SSE had committed to reinstating the 'faux brickwork'
 by 17th March. This has clearly not happened yet, and I have asked OCC to
 provide an update.
- Upper narrows safety Cllrs Parkes, Leach and I met with residents of homes in the upper narrows. Their concerns were related to traffic in the narrows that seems to be getting faster and more aggressive in recent months, risking pedestrian safety, especially children and pets. We discussed a number of potential solutions that we are following up on including placing traffic cones to put in front of homes alerting drivers to take care of walls and entrances, investigating options for traffic calming signs above the entrance to the upper narrows and options for better lighting in the narrows. The new parking scheme should at least help reduce congestion and increase visibility in the upper narrows.

Parish Clerk Vacancy – we are very sorry to report that our Parish Clerk Jane Yamamoto has decided to move on after more than four years of serving our community so well. This is a big loss for the Parish Council as I am sure that many members of the community who have worked with her over the years will appreciate.

We will formally be advertising the position in the May/June timeframe, but if you know of someone who may be interested in the role, please ask them to contact me for more information at cllrdonahue.whitchurchonthames@gmail. com. The role is a paid part-time position requiring an average of 8 hours a week work. The clerk is responsible for managing the Parish Council's finance and administrative matters and acting as a point of contact for residents raising matters to the council. The ideal candidate will be a resident of the village with general finance and administrative skills interested in getting involved in the community. There is training and advice available from the local association of local councils.

Annual Assembly 30th May – A reminder that our annual village assembly will be held in the Village Hall on Thursday 30th May from 7:30pm, with wine and nibbles being available from 7:15pm. We aim to finish by 9pm. Whether you are new to the village or a long-time resident, it's a great way to learn about everything that is happening in the village – and you won't want to miss the presentation of the annual Whitchurch Award!

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR COMMENTS

Not many people know that there is a national league table of local councils based on the amount of collected waste that is recycled, and in the past few years South Oxfordshire has hovered just off the number one spot, but last year with a recycling rate of 61.6% our District topped the table, with Vale of White Horse coming up in third place at 60.9%. Helping South Oxon is that 55% of the waste is made up of organic waste, principally garden waste but also the food-bin.

The government publishes a wealth of statistics on waste, and one figure that really struck me is that the amount of waste, across the country, going to landfill has dropped from 22m tons in 2000/01 to 1.76 million tonnes in 2022/23. The reduction in landfill is made up of several factors, including an overall reduction in household waste and increases in recycling and incineration.

There are imminent changes to the arrangements for paying for the garden waste collection service in South Oxfordshire which will be introduced from 1 April 2025. At the moment, every brown bin has its own direct debit payment, which means that if you have more than one bin you have more than one direct debit, each on the anniversary of each brown bin service starting for you. From April 2025, the direct debit process will be replaced by an annual payment in April for everyone, and once payment is made a sticker will be issued to be put on your bin so that the waste crew know that the service is paid for – no sticker, no collection! Apparently, there has been some cases under the current system whereby bins are emptied when no direct debit payment has been made. Anyway, no need to panic yet as more information will be sent to you.

The current charge of £60 for a brown bin is also having to rise to £69 as the costs of the service provided by Biffa have increased, and as the garden waste service is a paid for service it must breakeven, and not be subsidised by other council tax payers. You may remember the difficulties of a year or so ago when Biffa could not provide the normal service because drivers and operators had left for other jobs. The contract with Biffa, which has been in place for the last 14 years has just been extended for a further two years. A recent waste satisfaction survey has yielded encouraging results for SODC household waste collections, indicating a high level of resident approval

with this side of the service. An impressive 82% of respondents expressed satisfaction, or high satisfaction, with the overall quality of the service provided.

The move to extend the current contract was driven by central government's delay in clearly outlining the forthcoming changes within the waste industry stemming from the Environment Act 2021. The extra two years will provide the necessary space to develop a brand-new waste strategy to determine an approach for the next 10 years.

In setting the budget, and so Council tax for this year, although there are increases in various charges, there have also been savings. One of the biggest sources of income for the council is the return on investments, which have benefited from the recent general increases in interest rates, and in the current year SODC will receive over £7 million; £2m more than expected.

One of the savings that has been made is vacating the rented offices in Milton Park. Looking ahead, the Council is pressing ahead with new offices as part of the Didcot Gateway Regeneration project. Although this is a big investment, it is worth noting that offices at Milton Park were rented for about eight years at a total cost, including utilities, of about a million pounds a year, a substantial cost with nothing to show for it at the end

HARDWICK HAPPENINGS

Navigating Rain and Flooding

This year's unprecedented rainfall has brought significant challenges to the Hardwick community, especially with persistent flooding affecting the park fields and beyond. While this yearly creation of wetlands has been embraced by water birds, drawing migratory waterfowl like ducks and geese, and enriching biodiversity on the estate, the prolonged flooding has prompted some members of the boating community to resort to using unconventional modes of transport such as canoes! As we anticipate the summer months, hopes are high for drier weather. We're pleased to announce that plans are underway for a drainage system, diverting excess water into the moat and back into the Thames, alleviating the flooding issue and restoring our picturesque landscape to its functional splendour.

Managing Our Woodlands

In our woodlands, a surge in deer populations is posing a threat to young tree growth. The overgrazing by deer, compounded by the burgeoning squirrel population, impedes forest regeneration, ultimately affecting biodiversity. Addressing these ecological challenges demands careful management to safeguard the continued health and resilience of our natural environment.

Mid-Tier Projects Update

Looking ahead to the 2024 season, we're excited to report progress on implementing Countryside Stewardship grants. Initiatives include organic conversion, capital projects such as fencing, hedge laying, hedgerow improvements and enhancing species-rich chalk grasslands that support diverse plant and animal life, including pollinators, birds, and mammals, boosting ecosystem health. This will benefit our local communities by improving soil health, filtering water, and providing opportunities like birdwatching and nature walks. Moreover, we're thrilled to offer 'Educational Access Packages,' welcoming schoolchildren from the wider community to immerse themselves in countryside activities, from farming to traditional crafts. These grants are also extended to vulnerable and disadvantaged individuals, ensuring inclusivity and accessibility for all.

Spring Lambs have arrived:

Meet Peanut, one of the youngest lambs here at Hardwick. As part of our very friendly flock of Shetland sheep, Peanut contributes to both fleece production and our conservation grazing efforts. Their fleeces, dyed in many natural colours of the rainbow, cater to crafters, spinners, and felters alike.

Currently nestled in our community orchard, Peanut and his companions invite visitors to share in their company. While some lambs are already warming up to human interaction, others remain cautious. However, by



adopting a patient approach and simply sitting among them, visitors often find themselves rewarded with heartwarming moments as lambs curiously approach, nuzzle, and even curl up beside them.

Community Consultation Recap

In late February, the Whitchurch consultation meeting convened at the village hall, attracting a significant turnout. Key topics included the transition to a community-led charity and the shift from horse grazing to agriculture, notably at the stud farm. Feelings ran high as community members expressed their thoughts on the planned changes, reflecting a deep passion and commitment to the area. Since the consultation, the Hardwick community has rallied behind steering groups tasked with guiding the transition towards its charitable future. THE CRAYS POND COMMUNITY GROUP

The campaign to save the White Lion Crays Pond continues.

Help us to retain the ACV status.

The story is a long one, but here is a brief update.



Up to 2019 the owner was living in the property, contrary to legislation, and was eventually asked to leave by a High Court Judgement. Since then, the property has remained empty, becoming more and more dilapidated.

In 2019 we were successful in retaining the 'Asset of Community Value' (ACV) status (first granted in 2013), over the property although because of the pandemic the process took longer than usual, and also as the owner appealed and this appeal was rejected twice.

The ACV means that the property cannot be sold by the owner unless offered to the community first. It is a useful tool in the community's armoury.

It can stop disposal of the property as an 'Investment Opportunity'.

Since 2019 a Community Interest Company (CIC) in the pub's name has been established as a means of making offers to purchase (multiple times now!), applying for Community Ownership Funds to purchase, renovate it, and manage its improvement.

This is the vehicle that would own and run the property when we are successful.

We are now in the position to get the ACV nominated again and this is where we need your help as every 'Nomination' period of 5 years is a reapplication, not a renewal.

As years go by it becomes more difficult to maintain ACV status, with the property left to deteriorate and remain unused by the owner.

Therefore we need to show that the community, both local and the surrounding, support the campaign.

Supporting the project and to retain the 2024 ACV nomination helps the wider community decide what happens to The White Lion property, not just the owner.

As you know, once a pub is lost to development you never replace the community benefits that it provides. It is not just a pub, but a hub that can provide food, drink, accommodation, a meeting place, a market place, a focus for walkers, cyclists and others, or just a place to sit relax and reflect.

It can also add to the local commercial activity and can provide employment.

The White Lion Crays Pond is ideal, with the land it has, and the position it has to provide all this, not simply a plot for more residential development.


